You may be interested to note that the thirty year old FHG Crest on a blazer I wear regularly always elicits interest. In May last year I was quizzed on it by the Hong Kong correspondent for the London Times. Former Guardsman Profile - Chris Giguere

I have been a musician for almost as long as I can remember. From my very first, ill-fated lessons on the accordion, through many rewarding years of playing guitar, four years in the Drums, as many in the Queen's University Brass & Pipe Bands, and most recently, three years working as a professional singer/songwriter, performer and teacher, music has been the only common thread running through the various stages of my life.

Music is never truly "work" to me, so imagine how lucky I felt to be hired as a fifer in the Guard of '88. Not only lucky to have a summer job which at the time covered tuition and living expenses at university, but one in which I was paid to practice and perform music much of the time (though of course, not enough of the time!) Sure, the wool, the drill, the heat... but having a fife with you definitely made stands in the AB or parking lot pass more quickly than having a bayonet would (couldn't resist a dig at the squad!).

In many ways, the summer of '88 is my most fondly remembered, perhaps because it was so intense: in addition to manning duties, each sub-unit performed Sunset Ceremonies three times every two weeks; I was on several duty band trips, the most memorable to Chicoutimi, PQ; my Drums went to Washington, DC for a week where I was in a number of parades, and competed with the Marines in the Gunner's Gun; it was the 50th anniversary of the Guard and the first "Trooping of the Colours" (twenty more tunes!); and more Armstrong races; not to mention the "extracurricular" activities.

Of course there were many other good years in the Guard, in particular I am proud of the recording the Drums made in 1991. As Drum Major, I was largely responsible for the selection of the regular Drums program that year, as well as all the extra material needed to produce the full-length tape. I was also pleased to be asked to help in the mastering process a number of years later when they released the recording in CD format.

After leaving the Guard in the fall

of 1992, I also left the country. Travelling with Robb MacKay (FHG 1492), I backpacked around Europe for several months, returned to do a little more work for the Fort cataloguing the Museum Collection, then went tree planting in Saskatchewan and Alberta with fellow "post-Guard hippie" Brian Flynn (FHG 1391).

In the fall of '93 I returned to teaching guitar, something I had done for several years before joining the Guard. For the past several years, both Brian and I had been writing songs, and it was inevitable that in early 1994 the first incarnation of "The Fencesitters" would begin performing around Ontario featuring Brian, myself, and Steve Howes (FHG 1487) on drums. By Christmas of that same year we had a new five-piece line up and recorded an eight-song cassette with Chris Overgaard (FHG 1506) on drums. The band played steadily through 1994, and when Chris O. accepted an offer to attend medical school at the University of Toronto, Robb MacKay offered to return to Kingston from the London area where he had been drumming professionally for the band "Safe As Milk".

The Fencesitters became known for featuring a largely original repertoire of songs displaying an eclectic blend of folk, rock, and celtic influences, to name but a few. We toured incessantly, made a number of local, provincial, and national television appearances, and developed a respectable fan base along the 401 corridor between Ottawa in the east and Windsor in the west. Having recorded a live CD in the spring of 1996, and completed a gruelling 50-show festival and club tour in July and August, we were involved in pre-production for a studio album when "creative differences" finally came to a head. The Fencesitters played their final show at Kingston's "All Folks" Festival July 19th, 1997.

Over the years, I have become more and more involved at the Kingston School of Music where I teach guitar, and in 1996 had taken over management and

administrative duties at the school. In January of 1997, the opportunity arose for me to take ownership of the school as well, and this seemed like an ideal way for me to continue to make music and maintain a relatively stable living (songwriting and performance have often been likened to a lottery).

Presently, I continue to teach guitar at the Kingston School of Music, along with Robb MacKay who teaches drums, and Brian Flynn who teaches violin. Other ex-guardsmen on staff are Chris Coleman (FHG 1236) who teaches everything under the sun (clarinet, bass, mandolin, flutes), and Geoff Crowson (FHG 1427) who teaches drums and percussion. I also still perform with Brian, and Julie Mylks, a voice teacher at the school, in a folk trio called "Obsidian" and am in rehearsal with a new pop/rock group tentatively named "Mrs. Warren's Profession", featuring Robb again on drums.

I was married on September 27th, 1997 to Jenny Corlett, a highland dancer I met in the Queen's Bands, who is currently a teacher specializing in outdoor education and adventure therapy. R & R With the Registrar

(This is a brief summary of my Report to the AGM in August)

To date the 1997 Club membership total is 525 including Taffy Way and 7 Affiliate members. The average total over the last 5 years is 546. (Ed. Note. Congratulations Guard Club - that is an incredible accomplishment!)

Partly in the interest of conserving funds for current Guard support, without undue sacrifice of the basic Newsletter purpose of keeping in touch again and yet again, I deleted addresses from the mailing list a little more quickly when membership support wasn't apparent. The addition/deletion summary for addresses to the basic Newsletter mailing lists of 1994 to 1997 shows a net decrease of 59 for each mailing.

As we approach REUNION '98,

I'll be expanding our NL mailing list and sending several hundred Reunion notices and registrations without Newsletters to save dollars but to make REUNION information more widely distributed. Several new programmes on Internet have made searching for address updates quite a bit less tedious than searching phone books in the library.

I'll be making 3 items a priority in the next year:

1...a concerted effort to reach the rest of former GUARDS of the last 4 years - fewer than 60% of those have left us SOS info sheets to enable contact.

2...as a part of an efficiency reorganization or parallel to it, this Registrar will resume active management of the merchandising branch to work with Michael from a base at AABEN to strengthen this part of our service. As announced in the last

newsletter, replica brass cannons and blazer crests will be added to our offering list before Christmas.

3...the response for Email addresses lately suggests we need a review and possible update in our computer capacity and speed (and a real modernization of one Registrar's skills - even though my wife Pat still gives immense time & effort). The response also suggests the need for a CLUB Email address. I've had about 60 Email contacts lately especially for data updates, Newsletter material, and address requests. Possibly this Email contact, the Newsletter (especially Fred's work & the 'Where They Are Now' column) and the expanding Internet pages are really promoting the second Newsletter purpose - interactive responses and this is as it probably should be.

USMC Visit - A Time-Treasured Tradition

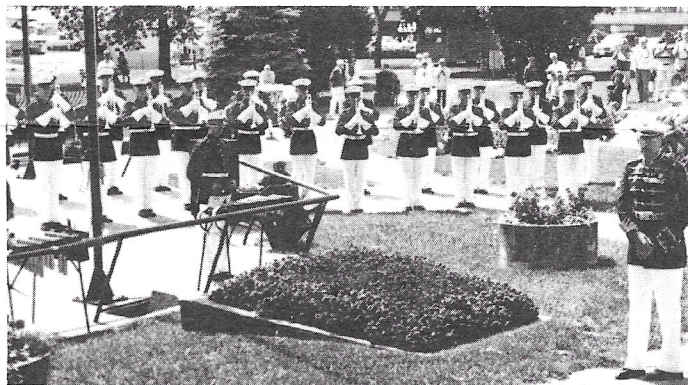

"When you first get there the people come up and greet you, and immediately you see familiar faces. It is great to see old friends and make new ones at the fort," said Zeiler. "They go out of their way to make us feel welcome."
